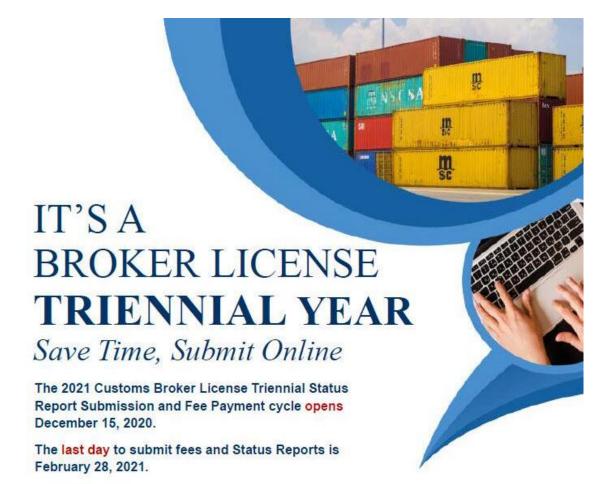

CBP: Who are we?

US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) is the largest federal law enforcement agency within the US Department of Homeland Security (DHS). Our primacy operation is border patrol, but we also regulate and facilitate international trade, collect import duties, and enforce U.S. regulations pertaining trade, customs and immigration.

Our headquarters is in Washington D.C. with field offices across the country.

CBP has a workforce of over **58,000** employees, including **officers and agents**, **agriculture specialists**, **aircraft pilots**, **trade specialists**, **mission support staff**, **and canine enforcement officers and agents**.

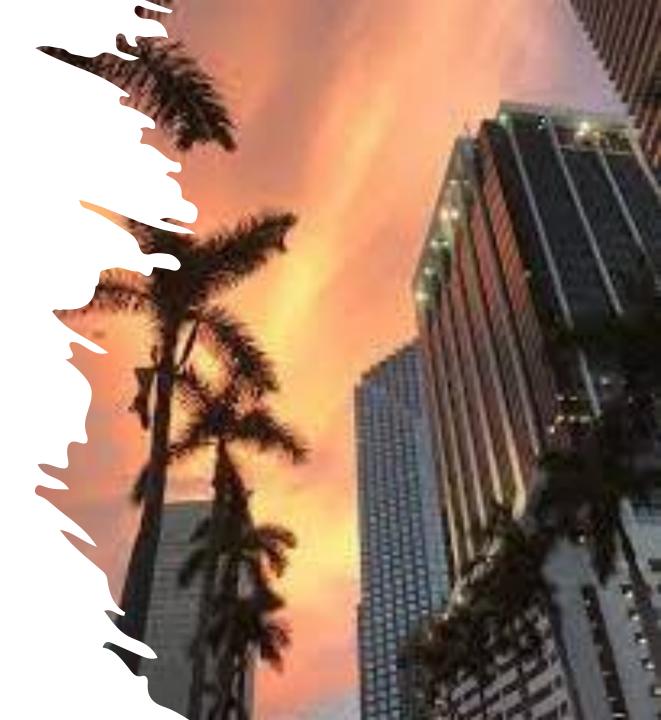


Welcome to Miami

Here at US Customs and Border Protection (CBP), we are committed to safety and protection of commerce and trade.

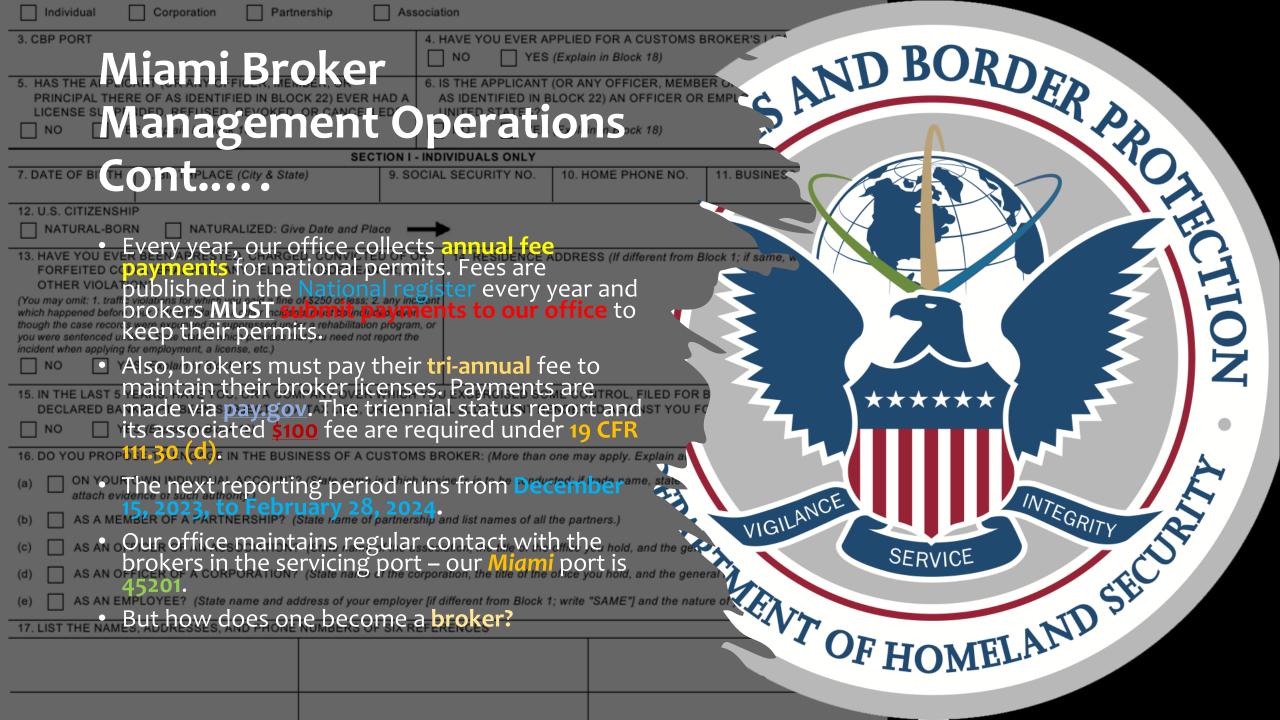
Our presentation deals with a very important aspect of commerce and trade: broker compliance.





Miami Broker Management Operations

- Miami's BMO office is located near Miami International Airport (MIA). It is located within the Cargo Clearance Center (CCC) on NW 25th Street. Our office handles broker compliance, licensing, fee payments, and national permits.
- All forms, payments, and other issues can be addressed her in the CCC building, **Suite 236.**
- MIA BMO officers are Andrew Vaz, Customs Entry Officer (CEO) and Benito Montero, Supervisory Customs Entry Officer (SCEO).



How to become a broker....

The first task one must do to become a broker is **pass** the <u>written Customs</u>
Brokers License Examination.

After passing the examination, an application for an individual license must be submitted within the three-year period after the applicant took and passed the written examination.

The applicant must be a citizen of the United States and twenty-one (21) years of age prior to the date of submission of the application and NOT a federal employee of the United States Government.



How to become a broker continued....

CBP also issues broker licenses for corporations, partnerships, and associations. A licensed broker would act as the qualifier for the business and an application would be submitted using the same CBP Form 3124.

 The license qualifier <u>DOES</u> need to be an officer of a <u>corporation</u> or <u>association</u>, or member of a <u>partnership</u>.

 Failure to have a qualifying officer or member (of a partnership) for more than 120 days will result in the revocation of the broker license.



CBP Form 3124

- CBP Form 3124 (pictured right) is the standard form used by applicants to obtain a broker's license. Individuals, Corporations, Partnerships, and Associations may use this form and submit it to our office along with their application package.
- License application fees are \$300 for an individual license application and \$500 for an organization license application; plus, a fingerprint processing fee for an individual applicant or each officer/member/owner identified in an organization application. The fingerprinting fee is \$11.25 for each individual.

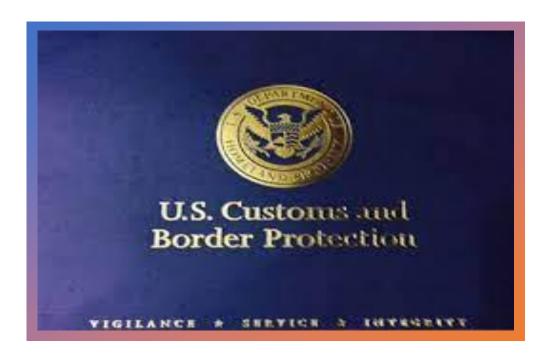

Broker License Applications

- Potential applicants for a broker license may apply after they pass the Customs Broker License Examination. *The license application fee is \$300 for individuals, \$500 for corporations, partnerships, and associations.
- Each Broker license applicant must undergo a background investigation that includes a fingerprint analysis and review of character references, credit reports, and arrest records. Arrests and convictions do not necessarily preclude the issuance of a license. *The broker may pay a fingerprinting fee of \$11.25 for the background investigation.
- In partnership, association, or corporation applications, individuals identified as principals with controlling interest, officers, partners, or members will also undergo a background investigation.
- The processing Center may reject an application as improperly filed if the application, on its face, demonstrates that one or more of the basic requirements listed in 19 C.F.R. 111.11 for a license have not been met at the time of filing, in which case the application and fee will be returned to the filer without further action.

Filer Codes and National Permits

- A national permit is required for the purpose of transacting customs business throughout the customs territory of the United States as defined in § 101.1 of this customs manual.
- A national permit issued under paragraph (a) is subject to the permit application fee specified in § 111.96(b) and to the customs user permit fee specified in § 111.96(c). The fees must be paid at the processing Center (see § 111.1) or through a CBP-authorized EDI system at the time the permit application is submitted.

Filer Codes and National Permits continued....

- Brokers seeking a **filer code**, must write a letter to the Port Director of the port where their entries are filed, to the attention of the **Broker Management Officer**. If you have operations at **more than one port**, make your request to the port where you conduct most of your business.
- The broker shall use this assigned code as the beginning three characters of the number for all CBP entries, regardless of where the entries are filed.
- The following information must be provided in the letter: the company name, phone number, address, contact person, the company's federal tax ID, and the entity requesting a filer code (i.e. importer, exporter or carrier).
- U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) will assign a unique 3 character (alphabetic, numeric, or alpha numeric) entry filer code to all licensed brokers filing CBP entries.

Broker Compliance

- Brokers are responsible to maintain compliance on their licenses and permits with US Customs and Border Protection (CBP).
- Recently, CBP has identified activities in the brokerage community that warrant immediate corrective action:
- A Customs broker license may NOT be transferred among persons. For example, an individually licensed Customs broker may not solicit and/or engage in "Customs business" as a corporate Customs broker without a corporate Customs broker's license.
- Unlicensed persons may NOT use a Customs broker's filer code, permit and/or license for the purposes of soliciting and/or engaging in "Customs business." For example, an unlicensed freight forwarder who employs and utilizes a Customs broker's license, permit, and/or filer code may not engage in "Customs business" or present itself as a Customs broker.



Broker Compliance Continued....

- Pursuant to 19 U.S.C. 1641(b)(6), unlicensed persons who transact "Customs business" without holding a valid broker's license are liable for a monetary penalty not to exceed \$10,000 for each such transaction.
- In addition, a licensed Customs broker who allows an unlicensed person to use his or her Customs broker's license or filer code for purposes of engaging in "Customs business" subjects the Customs broker to monetary penalties and refusal by the Port Director of the Customs broker's use of his or her assigned entry filer code.
- Both licensed and unlicensed members of the trade community who are engaging in the above identified illegal activities must cease and desist such activity.





ACE: Modernized and Legacy

- CBP utilizes both ACE (Automatic Commercial Environment) Legacy and Modernized portals.
- U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) is modernizing the Automated Commercial Environment Secure Data Portal (ACE Portal) over multiple phases in 2022 and 2023. The modernization effort will entail the transition of existing functionality to an upgraded platform, offering easier use and better performance.
- The ACE Portal offers users real-time access to trade data through features such as ACE Reports, ACE account management, and electronic communication with CBP and Partner Government Agencies (PGA).



Future

- CBP plans to expand the **eCBP portal** to collect additional broker fees in the future.
- ACE has replaced the Automated Commercial System (ACS) and there are programming changes required in order to successfully transmit data to CBP via ABI.

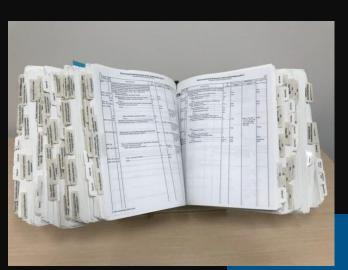
